## **Notes and Comments**

Analytic Teaching, the program, is entering its fourth year. We have trained over one hundred and twenty teachers. There are approximately 2,500 Fort Worth students involved on a regular basis with Analytic Teaching. Questionnaires have been prepared and are now being mailed to all of the teachers we have trained. In the next issue of this journal we should have results of that questionnaire.

David K. Sellars Elementary School in Fort Worth is implementing Analytic Teaching on a school-wide basis (kindergarten through fifth grade). As far as we know, no other school in the county has been that involved with Analytic Teaching. The entire student body has been pretested. The posttest will take place in April, 1983. We will publish the results.
