

## NOTES OF INTEREST

Several notes of interest to readers. First, The North American Philosophy for Children Association is growing. If you wish to become a member and to participate in the first conference tentatively scheduled for the summer of 1994, please notify Mort Morehouse at Viterbo College. A strong and active North American Philosophy for Childrens Association can provide support for new programs, address training and education needs particular to North America, and further research activities and scholarship.

Secondly, Felix García Moriyón has agreed to host the next ICPIC congress. It will be held at the Universidad de Alcalá de Henares which is located in a small town outside Madrid. The congress is scheduled for September 22-25, 1993. Those interested in submitting a paper are encouraged to send an abstract by June 1 to the Spanish Center for Philosophy for Children, Ferán Gonzales, 23, (2-A), Madrid 28009, Spain. All abstracts should be submitted on Computer Disk (Wordperfect format) and an original paper version. Topics considered for the conference are: 1) Varieties of implementation of philosophy for children; in what ways and contexts is the program being used, and what research has been done to support such use? 2) What is the place of philosophy for children in moral and political education in the face of current world development? 3) How can (or does) philosophy for children address the challenges placed on education by feminist, environmentalist and multi-cultural perspectives? 4) In what ways can philosophy for children foster development of the types of creative thinking needed to cope with contemporary problems? Felix tells us that the conference will be conducted in keeping with the stated aims of ICPIC, that is, no papers will be read. Rather, abstracts will be sent to all participants well before the conference. Participants will be expected to familiarize themselves with this material and come ready to discuss the ideas presented.
